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





## Life as a Pirate

ead the following paragraph and then decide if the sentences are *true* (T) or *false* (F).

In the popular modern imagination, pirates of the classical period were rebellious, clever teams who operated outside the re stricting bureaucracy of modern life. In reality, many pirates ate poorly, did not become fabulously wealthy, and died young. Unlike traditional Western societies of the time, many pirate clans operated as limited democracies, demanding the right to elect and replace their leaders. The captain of a pirate ship was often a fierce fighter in whom the men could place their trust, rather than a more traditional authority figure sanctioned by an elite. However, when not in battle, the ship's quartermaster usually had the real authority. Many groups of pirates shared in whatever they seized; pirates injured in battle might be afforded special compensation. Often all of these terms were agreed upon and written down by the pirates, but these articles could also be used as incriminating proof that they were outlaws. Pirates readily accepted

outcasts from traditional societies, perhaps easily recognising kindred spirits, and they were known to welcome them into the pirate fold. Such practices within a pirate clan were tenuous, however, and did little to mitigate the brutality of the pirate's way of life.







## Care to Join Me for a Cup of Tea?



ack in the 18th century, Anna Russell, Duchess of Bedford, decided that dinner was served too late and she needed a meal before that, because she got too hungry to wait. So she asked her butler to start bringing tea, bread, and butter to her chambers at 5 o'clock. She soon found that this afternoon snack was the perfect excuse to ask her friends to come over, and that is how a new social event was born.



- tablecloth
- serviettes (napkins)
- crockery (teacups, saucers, teapot)
- silverware (teaspoons, butter knives, etc.)
- strainer (in case you use tea leaves instead of teabags)
- sugar, milk, lemon, and/or cream
- and, of course, tea!

#### How to make the perfect English tea

First, fill your teakettle with fresh water. Ask an adult to place the teakettle on the stove and bring the water to a boil. While you wait, fill your teapot with hot tap water to allow it to warm up so it won't crack when the boiling water is poured in. When the water in the teakettle is about to boil, pour out the tap water and add approximately one teaspoon of tea leaves—or one teabag—for each cup of tea. When the water boils, ask an adult to remove it from the stove and pour the water into the teapot. Remember what Emily's song says: "To get a good infusion, we must always let it sit." So wait two to five minutes before serving. If you used tea leaves, don't forget it will be necessary to use a strainer. Depending on what you like, you can add sugar, milk, lemon, or cream. The English typically accompany their tea with scones, jam, toast, cake, and finger sandwiches. Find a recipe for scones below. Enjoy!

#### Let's make scones!

First, put the following ingredients in a large bowl: 2 cups of plain flour, 1/4 cup of sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoons of baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon of baking soda, 6 tablespoons of cold butter, and a pinch of salt. Mix using your hand. Next, in a different bowl, whisk together 1 large egg, 1 tablespoon of vanilla extract, and 2/3 cup of plain yogurt mixed with some milk (the English use buttermilk, but this will do). Make a well in the dry ingredients, add your liquid mixture, and fold together with a plastic spatula. Gently pull together into a ball, and roll out the dough on a floured surface until it's 1 cm thick. You can use a biscuit cutter to create circular scones. Place the scones on a greased baking tray, and brush the tops with egg yolk. Ask an adult to place the tray in the oven and bake for about 15-20 minutes, until golden brown. *Bon appétit!* 

o you wanna be a pirate, huh? Well, you might not have a ship, but there are a lot of movies about pirates out there, so why not grab some popcorn, call some friends, and watch a breathtaking pirate adventure? You can even ask your teacher if you can all watch it at school! So set sails and... action!

#### Treasure Island (1950)

The Walt Disney production of the Robert Louis Stevenson classic novel Treasure Island is one of the company's best live-action films of the '50s, and one of the best family-oriented adventures ever filmed. Bobby Driscoll plays Jim Hawkins, a young cabin boy who battles the pirate Long John Silver (Robert Newton) for a treasure.



#### Peter Pan (1953)

Wendy enjoys telling her younger siblings stories about the mythical Peter Pan, the little boy who never grew up. One night, much to everyone's surprise, Peter flies into the Darling nursery, in search of his shadow, which Wendy had previously captured. Sprinkling the kids with magic pixie dust, Peter flies off to Never-Never Land ("First star to the left

and straight on till morning"), with Wendy, Michael and John following behind. Once in Peter's domain, the children are terrorized by Captain Hook, who intends to capture Peter and do away with him.

#### The Goonies (1985)

It is a film about a band of kids from a neighborhood of Astoria, Oregon, which they have nicknamed the "Goon Docks". The "Goonies", hoping to save their homes in the Goon Docks from demolition, go on an adventure to find the buried treasure of a legendary 17th-century pirate named One-Eyed Willie.

#### Hook (1991)

The film is based on J.M. Barrie's Peter Pan and acts as a sequel to the events in the novel, focusing on a grown-up Peter Pan who has forgotten his childhood.



#### Cutthroat Island (1995)

Morgan Adams (Geena Davis) and her learned slave, William Shaw (Matthew Modine), are on a quest to recover the three portions of a treasure map. The treasure is hidden on a mysterious Cutthroat Island. Unfortunately, the final portion is held by her villainous uncle, Douglas ('Dawg') Brown (Frank Langella). Her crew is skeptical of her leadership abilities, so she must complete her quest before they mutiny against her.

This is made more difficult by the efforts of the Royal Navy from Jamaica under the command of the self-serving Governor Ainslee (Patrick Malahide) to end her piratical career. On her ship, Morning Star, Morgan starts the voyage to Cutthroat Island.

## Pirates of the Caribbean: The Curse of the Black Pearl (2003)

The story follows pirate Captain Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp) and blacksmith Will Turner (Orlando Bloom) as they rescue Elizabeth Swann (Keira Knightley) from her kidnapping by the cursed crew of the Black Pearl, captained by Hector Barbossa (Geoffrey Rush).

#### Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest (2006)

The story picks up from where the first film left off when Captain Jack Sparrow discovers his debt to the villainous Davy Jones (Bill Nighy) is due, while Will Turner and Elizabeth Swann are arrested by Lord Cutler Beckett (Tom Hollander) for helping Jack Sparrow escape execution.

#### Pirates of the Caribbean: At World's End (2007)

The plot follows the crew of the Black Pearl rescuing Jack Sparrow from Davy Jones' Locker, and then preparing to fight the East India Trading Company, led by Cutler Beckett and Davy Jones, who plan to extinguish piracy.


## Treasure Hunt!



irates used to go searching for treasure all around the world. But hey! Why let them have all the fun? You can go on your own treasure hunt... all around your school! Just follow these steps and you'll be a Donovan Dash in no time.

## A True Love Story

id you know that our biologist, Christian Fletcher, was in fact a real-life sailor? His name was actually Fletcher Christian and he did fall in love with Maimiti. This is his story:

Born September 25, 1764, Fletcher Christian was the second youngest son of Charles Christian and Ann Dixon

Christian, who were to have ten children, six of whom survived infancy.

Charles died in 1768 when Fletcher was not yet four.
Ann proved herself grossly irresponsible with money.
By 1779, when Fletcher was fifteen, Ann had run up a staggering debt of nearly £6,500, and faced the very real prospect of debtors prison. Ultimately, Ann and her three younger children were forced to flee to the Isle of Man, where English creditors had no power. The three

elder Christian sons managed to arrange a £40 per year annuity for their mother, allowing the family to live in genteel poverty.

In 1783, now eighteen years old, Fletcher went on board the H.M.S. Eurydice, bound for a twenty-one month voyage to India. Some seven months out from England, he had been promoted from midshipman to master's mate.

Christian twice sailed to Jamaica. After that, he led a mutiny against

Captain William Bligh and appointed himself captain of the ship.

Following the mutiny, Christian stopped briefly in Tahiti where he married Maimiti, the daughter of one of the local chiefs on 16 June 1789. He then settled with Maimiti on Pitcairn Island, where they set the ship on fire so nobody would ever find them.




